Dear Friends,

This Summer, unlike most recent years Louise, Thomas and I are not visiting Greece. Over the years we have visited many areas of the Greek mainland as well as several islands. One of those islands is Ikaria. When we visited Ikaria was relatively undeveloped so the journey there and back was a little more complicated than we usually undertook. However it is another journey we made that I want to tell you about.

We set out one day to visit the ruin of Koskina Castle which sits high on the summit of one of the peaks in the middle of the island with commanding views over much of the island. As I said, Ikaria is rather undeveloped meaning that many of the roads are rather challenging and we were grateful for the jeep we were using. When at last we could see our destination (after many wrong turning and hesitant forays down interesting roads) we turned off the road and carried on up a track. Eventually we reached a point where even in the jeep we could go no further and we climbed the last bit up the side of the mountain on foot (and at times hands!).

The ruins, when you reach them, are not as impressive as many of the castles here in Britain, but they are an inspiring sight and their location is certainly a cause for wonder. The builders of this castle in the 10th Century carried the stone to a location that is still pretty inaccessible today and built what was a fairly substantial set of buildings in the heat generated by an Aegean sun.

For Louise and I the most stunning event was still to come. After centuries of wear and tear one building is still largely intact and its interior relatively undamaged. We entered out of the heat and harsh glare of a midday sun to find it was a chapel, complete with icons and the fuel for oil lamps. Again it was not the most dramatic or beautiful of chapels but the coolness, the stillness and the presence of the place refreshed us and rewarded us wonderfully for the effort we had made.

Opposite the doorway we entered by (there was no door) someone had placed a large hand-written sign which read as follows (complete with bad spelling and odd capitals):

> PLEASE, keep this place holy. PLEASE, DO NOT SMOKE HERE. Feel the beauty of this place. Look out of the Chappel and see and feel the beauty of the island IKARIA and the sea - This is the present of the Almighty God to us! When we keep this world clean, it is our present to God - let us be a Brotherhood of Humanity.

As we left the chapel we looked at the world with fresh eyes and marvelled again at the beauty of the island around us - the place had changed us. However the setting, the views, the chapel itself would not have changed us nearly so much if someone had not taken the time and made the effort to pen those words of encouragement and challenge - someone we will never know.

Who knows when a word of encouragement or a word of challenge spoken or written to those we do know will have an effect on them and change their lives in small or great ways? So keep up the encouragement and don't forget that at times we also need to challenge those we know.

For all who are caring for others, either in hospitals, or family members or friends at home, visiting and supporting those who need help.



The Synod's moderator post has been vacant since November 2019, when the Revd Nicola Furley-Smith became the URC's Secretary for Ministries.

Born in 1965 in Cuckfield in Sussex, Bridget Banks trained and worked in nursing, midwifery and research contracts for the Department of Health and then community development while doing her training at Southern Theological Education & Training (STETS) in Salisbury in 2002.

Bridget was ordained into Christ Church and Trinity URC in Crawley in 2006, and in 2010 the churches united. She has worked with Southern Synod for the past nine years which has included fulfilling roles as the Convener of the Local Church Leaders Advisory Group, Convener of Ministries, and for the past six months as shared moderator duties with the Revd George Watt.

Bridget said: "I feel rather nervous and yet proud to lead the Synod at this challenging time. I aim to support ministers and churches through this change and with the Synod, provide excellent resources for every church. We have the opportunity to find new ways of being church, to dream dreams and explore the new technology. I think the next seven years will be very exciting."



Sunday 13th September will be a special day.

WURC will be gathering for worship in the Sanctuary for the first time since Sunday 15^{th} March – a gap of 25 Sundays!

We have rearranged the Sanctuary space to ensure social distancing and there will be a new one- way route through the space. All will need to have



their temperature taken and be expected to disinfect their hands using the sanitiser provided.

It will be quite different, but it will be good to be able to meet to share worship again.

Some key points to give you a flavour of what will happen:

- Craig will be with us that Sunday and the service will start at 10.30 am. With us listening to the audio service. Craig will then deliver his sermon live, returning to the audio service to conclude!
- Junior church will also take place each week (starting after the 2nd hymn)
- Craig will then preach alternate weeks at St Andrews and so he will be back with us on 27th September
- We will gather to listen to the audio service on the weeks Craig is not with us
- This approach will allow us to continue enjoying the different voices and insights of members of both St Andrew's and Wallington
- We will all need to be wearing masks, and there will be no singing, offertory, or notices.
- The audio service will continue to be available on telephone (020 3870 2810) or church web site (wurc.org.uk) for those not able to join us at the church.

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All will be welcome, but it is elcome important to recognise that you should **not** join us:

- if you have a persistent cough, loss of the sense of smell or taste, or a high temperature.
- If you are self-isolating
- If you are classed as vulnerable.
- We realise this may exclude many of our congregation, but it is important we keep the Church and each other safe.

We will of course review this approach and respond to the changing Covid environment, but this gives a plan for the first few weeks. We will provide more detailed information nearer the time, but for now please hold all in prayer as we look forward to meeting together.


