Wallington United Reformed Church

Dear Friends,

Several years ago Louise, Thomas and I were holidaying on the island of Corfu. We spent one day in Corfu Town, the capital of the island, and besides visiting the Old Fortress, sipping a nice cold drink whilst overlooking the cricket pitch (unfortunately no game was in progress) and wandering around the maze of streets of the Old Town, we also visited the church dedicated to the patron saint of Corfu, St. Spiridon.

The day we had chosen (unbeknown to us) was an important feast day in the Orthodox Church so the church was very busy with devout Greek Christians coming to the church to pray and meditate before the icons of the church, including a very grand gold icon of St. Spiridon, and to pray in front of his silver coffin which is housed in a small chapel behind and to the right of the altar. In the church there were also a great many tourists like us who had come to see the church and perhaps to pray. There was one fairly large tour party who were seated in the chairs on the left side of the church whilst their guide informed them about St. Spiridon. As you can imagine it was anything but a peaceful scene, especially as many of those milling about were carrying icons, crosses, or candles that they had bought in the shops in the narrow street next to the church. Yet, strangely enough, it was a peaceful place and no doubting the sense of the Holy that was to be found there.

However the strangest thing for me was that in the midst of this throng a priest was carrying out a blessing service for baby twins whom the parents had brought to the church. Whilst he said the liturgy and prayed over them people were moving all about him and even between him and the altar and when he wished to hold the children over the tomb of St. Spiridon saying a prayer there, he had to

take his place in the queue of tourists and pilgrims who were waiting to enter the side chapel. He had to do this twice – once for each of the twins.

I couldn't help but think what my reaction would be if I was trying to hold a dedication or thanksgiving service for a child at Wallington and people were milling about in this way. At the very least I suspect I would say something sharp to those who got between me and the Communion Table!

But then I realised that the two are not comparable. Things would be very different in that church during the Sunday services - this was not a formal act of worship we were witnessing but something that was happening in a church which was at the heart of the town's life and which had visitors every day. Some of these would purely be sightseers, but others would be devout people of faith.

The parents who had brought their babies for this service knew that it would be full of people, and had chosen to do so. It was a very clear sign that the faith of these people was not separate from daily life but there to be celebrated in the midst of daily life. And those who had come to pray and meditate that day because it was a special day in their church's year also knew that there would be many tourists there, and it made no difference.

For these people their church and their faith were at the heart of the town and the community in which it was set, and I couldn't help but feel that here in this somewhat chaotic hubbub was something very precious and perhaps a reminder for us not to be too ready to separate our faith and church from the daily life of the community around us.

May we all find ways to bring our faith into the daily life of our community.

The 2021 United Nations Climate Change Conference, also known as COP26, is the 26th United Nations Climate Change conference.

The 26th UN Climate Change Conference of the Parties (COP26) is coming to the UK for the first time on the 1st – 12th November 2021. What's even more exciting is that the event will be held at the Scottish Event Campus (SEC) in Glasgow!

As well as the main COP26 event, Italy, who are the UK's COP26 partners, will be hosting a number of key preparatory events including a Youth Event and the Pre-COP Summit. These have been postponed due to the COVID19 pandemic but are now expected to take place Autumn 2021.

FINANCIAL FORECAST OCTOBER 2020

We are now seven months into the coronavirus pandemic, and Elders have been reviewing the church finances. Unfortunately, but unsurprisingly, the picture is not a happy one.

Earlier in the year we recognised that lockdown would cause a significant drop in our income for 2020 and 2021, but at the time it seemed that a cautious easing of restrictions might allow a return to something approaching normal before too long. Now the second spike is here and, it seems that significant restrictions are likely to be with us for some time.

Our income has reduced substantially, and we are rapidly eating into the financial reserves that we had built up over several years, which we had hoped to use to support various mission initiatives.

Congregational giving has declined. We are very grateful to record an increase in direct giving through our bank account, but giving through the freewill offering envelopes is down and not surprisingly the weekly cash offertory has dried up almost completely. However, we were heartened by the very positive response to the appeal for Harvest donations for the Sutton Women's Refuge.

Hall lettings revenue accounted for almost two thirds of our income last year, and has been hit very hard. Our premises were virtually unoccupied for six months from late March, except for Preschool. We cannot yet allow many of our hall users to return. Some activities cannot maintain social distancing, and some are currently meeting online. Other groups are unwilling to venture out, even to our Covid-secure environment. There are very few bookings for the rest of 2020 and we believe that there will only be a very minor increase during 2021 and possibly well into 2022.

Expenditure, on the other hand, does not reduce whether we are using the premises or not. Our annual contribution to the URC's national Ministry & Mission Fund remains unchanged, and is set to rise next year as other churches have been hit even harder than us. There may be a modest reduction in heating costs, but equipment still breaks down and has to be replaced – such as the water heater. Repairs are still needed to the structure, and we still have to insure the building. We have also incurred extra running costs in making the

premises Covid-secure, providing online and telephone services, and posting out regular communications to the congregation.

As a result, our expenditure is significantly outstripping income. Compared with a surplus of nearly £7,000 last year, in 2020 we will probably spend £20,000 more than we receive. We are likely to incur a similar deficit in 2021, and on current projections we will continue to lose several thousands of pounds each year for some years thereafter. Our reserves won't keep us going forever. If the virus continues to disrupt our lives, we will run out of money within a few years.

What can we do about this?

The Elders would like to encourage all who are able to do so to consider giving a little extra to help reduce our deficit and ensure the work of Wallington URC can continue.

We are planning to hold a Gift Day on **Sunday 22**nd **November**, in order to focus on the many gifts with which we have been blessed, and to acknowledge all of the contributions received for the work of the church, whenever and however received.

We recognise that not everyone will be able to participate but if you have been gathering up offertory contributions or other donations at home and can't bring them to the church, please pop them into an envelope and ask your Elder to arrange for someone to collect it. If you give direct to the bank please do continue to do so.

We'd like your ideas too. What can we do to increase income to cover our costs, in order to ensure that we can continue our mission in Wallington and further afield?

And finally, a look back at 2019:

Earlier this year the Elders put together our very first Trustees Annual Report and Accounts, which adds a report on our objectives and achievements last year to the accounts figures. We would have presented these at the AGM which didn't happen! If you haven't received the report by email and would like a paper copy please let Elaine know.

Holmwood Preschool in the Time of Covid

After the mixture of providing for children staying at home and those attending preschool in the summer term, all the children started the new school year coming to preschool, some as returners and some as new children.

For most children, starting preschool is the first time they have been left with non-family members. For some, it is the first time they have left mummy. It is a huge step for both the children and their parents. Usually new children and their parents have a visit to preschool to introduce the children to the environment, to give the parents a feel for what their little one is going to be doing each day and to get important paperwork completed. But that could not happen in this 'covid year'.

Julie our admissions administrator, dealt with all the paperwork and made a lot of extra phone-calls and trips to people's doorsteps to get everything in place. But how should we help the parents to prepare their children?

Parents were sent a virtual tour of the parts of the building and the outside areas used for preschool and, in July, we invited the parents of the children already attending preschool to write messages to those parents who children were due to start. These turned out to be the most heart-warming testimonials to the work of Karen and the team. Here are a few extracts:

"From the detailed written reports, verbal feedback at the door and happy children, I know that the staff truly care for every one of their students. If you want to send your child to a welcoming, caring, and supportive pre-school then Holmwood is for you!"

"The staff are amazing and dedicated to all the children there, their time, efforts and love for the children really shows."

"The stand-out thing for us was the care and attention the staff showed towards providing us with feedback about her progress through the school, which was concluded with the wonderful book they produced at the end of her time there."

"They have such pride in their work and take care to develop close relationships with each of the children.

This is evident from the personal feedback from the teachers in person and via the online software they use, which revealed week after week how well they actually knew my child. They teach the early years curriculum in such an incredibly imaginative way ensuring that the children are always learning and absorbing information whilst playing games, having fun and socialising."


