Dear Friends....

Over the past few years I have become increasingly interested in my family history and have been cooperating with other family members to try and construct our family tree. I recently had a phone conversation with one of my father's cousins who has undertaken some research and whom I haven't previously spoken with. In fact I am not sure I have ever met her.

Whilst we were speaking familiar regrets were expressed, which I have also heard from my father - that when they were younger they didn't take more notice of the exploits of family members who were visiting and more recently they hadn't take the opportunity to seek information from relatives who are now no longer around.

The Gospel writers seek to provide information about Jesus for his followers who didn't know him personally. As time went by, of course, this meant more and more people until there came a time when there was no one left who had physically met Jesus. Sometimes I imagine the Gospel writers raising questions similar to those I and my relatives pose: when did he visit a particular place? Who also was there? What was said? Was this before or after he had been to....?

The Bible, in particular the Gospels but also the New Testament letters, provide us with the information and guidance we need as we seek to be followers of Jesus today. At times it is very clear but often we wish there was more detail and we wish the writers had gone deeper in their research – but maybe, like those of us trying to grasp the intricacies of our family history, they missed opportunities and sometimes recognised the questions they needed to ask after it was too late.

Nevertheless I often wish that I could have met someone who knew Jesus. And then I realise that I have — not just one person but many, many people. The church is full of people who have met Jesus, not physically face-to-face but in their life experiences, prayer life and discipleship. There are people all around us whom we can ask 'what is Jesus like?' or 'what would Jesus want us to do about this?' That is part of what it means to be the church — a group of people who together are working out what it means to follow Jesus based on what we know and have experienced of him. It is also a call to deepen our knowledge and experience of Jesus so that when people ask us 'what is Jesus like?' we are able to give an answer.

Junior Church Books

The end of August usually brings a flurry of activity often focused on visits to "Oasis" the Christian bookshop in Wallington when thinking of our young people in Junior Church.

This is in anticipation of the "book presentation" on behalf the Wallington United Reformed Church family expected in September. 2020 didn't do "as usual", so we take this opportunity in Contact to give comment and list of books delivered to the homes of our children and young people to encourage and challenge them along their individual Christian Faith journey.

It's a privilege and pleasure to spend time browsing books to choose for them from what we know are their interests; guided by some illuminating conversations and not forgetting their "tricky" questions on Sunday mornings, a while ago now!

The following books were chosen for our Young People in High School, Sixth form and at College.

"Unquestioned Answers", Author: Jeff Myers. The title leapt out with chapters, each with a title cliché such as "Just have faith", "It's not my place to judge" which all too easily may trip off of our tongues! The Author explores the questions; Are these true? and what do they really mean?

"Simply Christian" (why Christianity makes sense) Author: Tom Wright. This is another engaging read with personal stories and biblical perspective from the author engaging discussion in longings for justice, relationships, beauty and how life can be lived differently.

"God's Peace when you can't Sleep" Author: Christina Vinson. A "dip in" book of short reflections and prayers addressing common anxieties to us all.

"The Teenage Prayer Experiment Notebook" Authors: Miranda and Noah Threlfare-Holmes. Each chapter, included a well presented "experiment" activity to try different ways of exploring

prayer. Such as making a contemplation bottle, lego prayers, a prayer den! I read most of this one and hope we can use this in church!

With cartoon style illustrations, this addresses issues, common to us all but particularly to young people. Bear Grylls includes his own honest experience of anxiety, fear and the

place his faith has for him with examples, "the bravest thing to do is talk about our fears to someone we trust and that includes God."

and ventilation) and had an office in Cardiff. He had a friend who used to take the train to London quite frequently and related the following experience to my father:

'One morning I just managed to catch the Paddington express – the Red Dragon, if I remember – at Cardiff General, and it was only after I'd settled into what I thought was an empty compartment, when I noticed a little girl sitting in the corner. She looked about eight or nine years of age and was quite alone. The train was about to depart and – naturally concerned – I leaned across and asked her if there was a grown-up with her.

"Oh, no", she replied simply.

'The next stop was Newport, about fifteen minutes away, and, to my surprise, she made no move to get out. I asked her whether anyone was meeting her, and she shook her head.

"But this is an express," I continued, "and it doesn't stop until it gets to London."

"Yes, I know," she answered. When we moved out of the station, my curiosity again got the better of me, and I asked her,

"Excuse me, but aren't you just a little bit frightened at travelling all alone on such a long journey? In a short while we go through a long tunnel and that can be quite scary!"

"Oh no," she replied with a smile,

"you see, my daddy's the engine-driver!""

Of course, as I grew older, I challenged my father on some of the theological assumptions of the story – true though it may well have been.

How 'alone' is each one of us in life? Is our journey's end pre-destined?

I remember my father gently explaining to me that if you overdissected parables you might miss the main point!

In this case, the simple truth, affirmed as long as 3000 years ago by the Psalmist, is that – though we may seem sometimes to be travelling alone, we are never unaccompanied.

Our Father's love never leaves us. His love never smothers or inhibits us, but allows us to grow as individuals into the people He intends for us to be – and we pray that that will be in the image of his Son, our Lord and Saviour Jesus Christ.

Prayer: Father God, remind us of your everlasting love for us; reassure us of your presence alongside us, every moment of every day; grant that we may travel with you, comforted and strengthened.

And may we comfort and strengthen those with whom we journey. Amen.

We continue to be delighted with the messages of positive support we receive from schools who have been able to utilise these in their week, and we know that this means many more pupils in those particular schools are having some form of Christian input than we would otherwise have delivered.

We have had our second prayer meeting online, and were delighted to have been joined by two visitors from elsewhere in the country who have found our work online and wanted to come along simply to support us.

We obviously still want to get back into the school buildings and engage with people. It appears this will not happen until 8th March at the earliest, but we continue to pray for something extraordinary to happen. Our staff meetings always look forward to prepare for what we think is going to occur.

All schools need our prayer support. Many staff are simply overwhelmed and running on auto-pilot, and we must continue to raise them up and support them.

It is our intention to work with the schools to offer some form of emotional and spiritual support wherever we can. If the schools do go back on the 8th March, that only gives them 3 weeks of the term to go, and there's every possibility schools won't be able to invite us in during that time. Please pray that when we are able to be back in schools we may be able to respond.

Please continue to pray for our Easter lessons. There will be a new presentation, incorporating a video of the Easter story. We all know how important the message of the death and resurrection of our Lord is.

There is a 'map' of Lent, 250 stickers, a diary with space to journal and lots of prayers, challenges and activities, as well as a recipe booklet.

It is designed to be handed out or posted to individuals and families to help sustain and inspire them through Lent at this challenging time. The key focus is building connections with God and others.

Saying 'Thank You'

Being thankful is an attitude, a choice we can make whatever our circumstances. It can be a habit to foster during Lent.

Here are some suggestions to help you be more thankful: **Start each day** by thanking God for today! This is the day that the LORD has made; let us rejoice and be glad in it. (Psalm 118:24)

End each day by giving thanks for three things from the day, three things you have appreciated, however small. If you wrote these down each day you would have a record of over 1,000 blessings each year!

Remember to say thank you to everyone who does anything for you today.

Think about the past week, month, year – who would you most like to thank for their support or help?

Make or write a card to send them, expressing thanks.

Give thanks before each meal, drink and snack you have today. Think of all the people who have been involved in growing, packing, transporting, selling and making what you are eating and drinking. Pray for them as you thank God for sustaining you through this food and drink.


