Dear Friends,

I went to a West End theatre recently to see Harry Potter and the Cursed Child. It was a wonderful experience with some amazing special effects and it absorbed me for an afternoon and an evening. (It's in 2 parts so the 1st part was a matinee and the 2nd part then followed in the evening.) I won't spoil it for anyone who hasn't seen it and might go to see it one day, however the title of the play got me thinking since there is actually more than one person who could be the 'cursed child' of the title. The title we give something is important because it can influence how we approach it, whether it is a play, a person, a place, a story or a parable.

A parable? Yes, the titles that have been given to the parables of Jesus over time, which appear as headings in most Bibles, can influence how we approach them and what we remember about them. In many cases the historic titles help us to engage with the parable and remember a strong point; 'The Good Samaritan' is one example – what else could it be called? (Maybe 'The foolish traveller who took a dangerous road alone'?) Others may not be so clear.

The parable of 'The Prodigal Son' is one that intrigues me. The title can lead us to focus on the younger son who is wasteful and extravagant with his inheritance and ends up in dark place. He recognises where he is and, through turning around and admitting his errors, is brought back to a good place. It becomes about the son and can all too easily be used as a moral lesson handed out to those younger than ourselves as a warning for life.

If we consider where in the Gospels the parable is found then other titles might suggest themselves. The parable is the third of three illustrations given by Jesus that we find in Luke chapter 15. The two that precede it are first about a lost sheep and second about a lost coin. So another title for the parable, which I have heard and may have used myself, could be 'The Lost Son'. There is however another element that links these three stories – rejoicing. The shepherd calls his friends and neighbours to rejoice that he has found his sheep and the woman also calls her friends and neighbours to rejoice when she has found her coin. At the end of the parable when confronted by the older son the father says 'But we had to celebrate and rejoice...' So these three stories could be 'the rejoicing shepherd', 'the rejoicing woman' and 'the rejoicing father'. I like this final title because it focusses our thoughts on the father, who is representative of God, and how he responds to us when we have lost our way. Perhaps there are other parables which come to mind that might, from time to time, benefit from a different title to help us focus on God's activity.

I indicated earlier that it is also important what title or names we give to people. In one sense this can be a matter of etiquette when in a formal setting but I think it is something for everyday life. What we call people, either to their faces, behind their backs or in general conversation with another matters. It reveals what we think of them and about them and the value we give them. When the labels we use are less than flattering or reflect our dissatisfaction with another we are probably not managing to see them as a child of God, just like us, made in his image.

The Union of the Churches

he formation of the United Reformed Church on 5th October 1972, from the union of the Congregational Church in England and Wales and the Presbyterian Church of England, left Wallington with two United Reformed Churches within several hundred yards of each other. Joint services had been held as far back as the winter of 1917, and attempts had already been made in 1969 to explore unity but the negotiations had come to nothing. The birth of the URC was a cause for joint celebration. The two churches joined in a service of Holy Communion on Sunday 8th October 1972. On 12th October the four URC churches in the London Borough of Sutton, along with Banstead, enjoyed an evening of light entertainment, and on Sunday 15th there was a pulpit exchange between Holmwood Gardens and St Andrew's Cheam.



Meanwhile, discussions on merging the two Wallington churches began. In March 1973, Christ Church presented proposals aimed at bringing the churches together within 5 years. In the interim, combined evening services and a joint newsletter were

agreed on. In January 1975, a joint pastorate was created. By March 1976, negotiations had again come to nothing, and church meeting agreed that efforts be suspended for the time being. The joint newsletter survived, and it was expected that the churches would join together for some special services.

In April 1981, John Waller, Interim Moderator of Christ Church, wrote in the newsletter of his hope that the two churches would pray more together and study the bible together. As a result, the Holmwood Gardens church meeting on 12th May agreed to invite John to discuss the future relationship of the churches. In September, the Elders met with John and with the Rev Gwynfi Davies who had meanwhile accepted a call to Christ Church. It was concluded that with Rev Davies' impending arrival, the time was not right.

In September 1985, letters from the minister and church secretary of Christ Church invited the Holmwood Gardens Elders to a joint Elders meeting to discuss their future together. The joint meeting agreed that it wished to work towards the establishment of a single congregation in one building. This was accepted unanimously by the Holmwood Gardens church meeting on 19th January 1986.

A working sub-committee was set up and professional advisers were engaged to assess the premises and help ascertain the way forward. By January 1987, the shape of the union had been decided and a shadow Elders committee set up. The Holmwood Gardens premises had been chosen as, although the church was smaller, the premises would be easier to maintain and there would be more scope for expansion. Although the new church was scoped for one full-time minister, John Ward would serve full time and Lesley Charlton part time until such time as one was called to another church. Small groups were set up to look at all aspects of worship and church life. From 1st March the two churches would worship together at Holmwood Gardens for all

evening services and the morning communion

services.

Finally, on 6th June 1987, Christ Church and Holmwood Gardens came together. The inaugural service, presided over by the Rev Cyril Franks, Moderator of the General Assembly, began with a short act of worship at Christ Church, followed by a procession along Stanley Park Road to Holmwood Gardens, accompanied by a



candle and the new church banner. The service ended with an act of worship and dedication at Holmwood Gardens, now Wallington United Reformed Church.

The Red, White and Blue is a way to remember the Platinum Jubilee of Queen Elizabeth II.

In 1952 The young Princess Elizabeth became Queen Elizabeth II.

A year later there was a special service, a coronation.

At that service there were several symbols given to the new queen. Each symbol is to help her remember something important.

One of the symbols given to the new Queen is a sword. But it's not like most swords. This sword, given to the new queen, actually has a broken tip. It was not sharp and pointed, but broken on

purpose, to remind her of something.

This sword with its broken tip symbolises mercy. In fact, it has a special name: Curtana, The Sword of Mercy. The broken tip reminds the Queen that she must not be cruel, but be merciful. She must find ways to bring peace not hardship in her judgements.

She was also given the sceptre with an orb and a cross on top, this symbolises the rule of Jesus Christ over the earth. The monarch holding this sceptre, signifies that she is a servant of an even greater monarch, Christ.



And a Bible, to symbolise wisdom, to show that the monarch is guided by the Word of God.

She also held the Rod of Equity and Mercy – symbolising mercy and equity. The sceptre is topped with a dove, a symbol of peace and the Holy Spirit.

70 years ago Princess Elizabeth became Queen, no one has ever reigned for 70 years before, and it is unlikely to happen again. A truly unique occasion.
