Dear Friends....

It's the middle of August as I write this and the waiting is over. For thousands around the country (and not just this country) the emptiness of the past 9 weeks or so is no more since the new football season has kicked off.

'Oh, no,' I hear you cry, 'not already!' But it's true, I'm afraid. And although those damp, cold, "dreechit" (as the Scots would say) days, when you trudge home dejectedly after seeing your team lose to your local rivals with a last minute goal, are difficult to imagine in these days of glorious sunshine and dry grass, they will come. It is in those times that the faith of the true football fan is seen. The lightweights who are only interested during the World Cup are the equivalent of people who only go to church for weddings, funerals and maybe at Christmas. Most Christians would feel hard done by if our faith was judged according to that standard.

For a Christian to be a football fan is not a problem. The challenge is to take their faith into their love and enthusiasm for the game. The Christian football fan should be distinctive, treating other fans and teams with respect, and when they need it compassion, too. Gloating and cheating may be unchristian but competitiveness isn't.

I came across the following passage the other day:

"Would Jesus go to watch a football match? I suspect that he would. He might even support one team over another, although he would appreciate good play from either side. He might join in with the singing, although not some of the less family-oriented chants. Jesus was (and is) interested in people, and if Peter and the others had been regulars on the terraces at Galilee Rovers, I don't see why Jesus wouldn't have gone along as part of his friendship with them. And if he did, you can bet that Peter and the others would

have rethought what they said and did when they were at the game. Yet again, bringing Jesus into a situation results in changed lifestyles."

This doesn't just apply to football. It is about all the things we choose to spend our time on. Enthusiasm for football, or another sport, or music, or art, or any one of a thousand things is not something to be derided. These are the things that capture the attention and enthusiasm of those around us and we shouldn't feel ashamed to share in them as well. Jesus would be there.

It's not so much about how we spend our time but what we are like when we are spending that time. Do we act with integrity? Do we do and say the same things there as we would in a church situation, and avoid doing and saying the same things there that we would avoid in the church situation? Do we leave our faith at the door or do we take it with us into our leisure time?

Just because our pastimes are relatively unimportant in themselves doesn't mean that we shouldn't treat them with the same seriousness as the rest of life – our faith is for them too.

May Christ be with you in both your important and unimportant activities.

The Uniting Church in Garden Lane

A unique alliance between a church and its community that has been ongoing for more than 120 years has established a

thriving partnership fit for the

future.

It is a traditional chapel established in 1880 for the Methodist Church. Worship has continued uninterrupted on this site since. The church has very strong links with the local community and is considered as being at the heart of what is now called the Garden Quarter.

In 2020, the Uniting Church in Garden Lane, a local ecumenical partnership between the Methodist

and United Reformed Churches in Mersey Synod, set about evaluating its current role as a place of worship.





And so, the Plum Project was born.

What does the plum symbolize?

They symbolise perseverance and hope, as well as, beauty thriving in adverse circumstances. As the Plum tree blossoms between two seasons, it is also seen as a symbol of spring - bringing warmth,

transition and the promise of fruitfulness.

Neil Kendall, Chair of the Plum Project, explains: "We already had activities like dance, drama, photography, non-traditional worship and music taking place in the building, but wanted to take steps ensure a future for community engagement – not just to ensure we could survive after the pandemic, but to also develop the diversity of the building's users and to encourage those people and groups to share their culture and experiences."

The project's steering group carried out a community survey to find out what local people wanted and secured funds to ensure the church building was sustainable and fit for purpose as a modern space designed to serve a wide variety of uses.

More than 200 people responded with 120 offering suggestions, which created a network of 'Plum Friends' and formed a basis of communication for future engagement.

"Here is a church and community growing in relationship, moving and responding together as they listen to the voices of their neighbours,"

Over three years, the church has involved its neighbourhood and the variety of skills from local people to plan and deliver festivals and gatherings, offer support to marginalised

communities.

Neil explains: "This included reworking our usual events like Harvest to include a community food-related workshop, bringing in healing events to mark memories of loss in November, and at Christmas developing a 'travelling nativity' on a pastoral journey around the neighbourhood.

"We also strengthened our partnerships with local organisations. For Refugee Week, we started working with the local primary school to include a creative workshop which produces artistic materials for the celebration. All this involved community members from start to finish."

Links with refugees continued during school holidays where members of the project noticed the need for support, especially for the parents of pre-school children. Help was also provided by way of acquiring re-conditioned bikes and providing somewhere to meet. Theatre and singing professionals offered places at summer workshops for both primary and secondary school-aged children, whilst a 'Sing and Sign' specialist offered sessions with Tots.

Create a quiet space:

Create a peaceful space to pause, and allow yourself to feel God's presence alongside you, as near to you as your own breath. In following the reflection below, as a church we will draw closer to God and to one another as we grow in faith and deepen our sense of belonging to God.

Luke 10:25-28 'Keeping our Hearts with God'

Just then a lawyer stood up to test Jesus. 'Teacher,' he said, 'what must I do to inherit eternal life?' ²⁶ He said to him, 'What is written in the law? What do you read there?' ²⁷ He answered, 'You shall love the Lord your God with all your heart, and with all your soul, and with all your strength, and with all your mind; and your neighbour as yourself.' ²⁸ And he said to him, 'You have given the right answer; do this, and you will live.'

At the moment I am reading *God's Smuggler* by a Dutchman called Brother Andrew, who sixty years ago was inspired to smuggle thousands of Bibles into Communist Eastern Europe over the years. Christians behind the



'Iron Curtain' had never felt more alone. He himself had undergone a change in his life and he felt called to the work and the book tells of how his faith grew from nothing to God will provide. Andrew went from church to church and group to group as the appetite of the people was huge. In many countries a Bible was scarce or non-existent. It has made me think of my faith and commitment and I remembered the hymn on the right. The number 'seven' appears many times in the Bible from the

day of rest in Genesis to leaving a field to rest in the seventh year. The fall of Jericho revolves around seven days.

Today, our society views Sunday as just another day, but when I think of Brother Andrew and the work of many who care, it becomes a special day, JUST as all other days. George Herbert's hymn reminds us that we are 'cleared' of all that is wrong in our lives, if we listen to God's voice. The final verse extols us to praise him in all we do each day of the week. It is what is within our hearts rather than rules that we should remember, as Jesus reminded the Pharisees. Thus the Son of Man is Lord of the Sabbath. So the day of rest is for our physical and spiritual good. We only have to think of the story of the Good Samaritan to think of 'seven whole days, not one in seven, I will praise thee', when the need is in front of our eyes.

Prayer:

You are invited to pray through the words of the hymn:

'King of Glory, King of Peace'

George Herbert (1593-1633)

King of Glory, King of Peace, I will love thee; and that love may never cease I will move thee. Thou hast granted my request, thou hast heard me; thou didst note my working breast, thou hast spared me. Wherefore with my utmost art I will sing thee, and the cream of all my heart I will bring thee.

Though my sins against me cried, thou didst clear me; and alone, when they replied, thou didst hear me.

Seven whole days, not one in seven, I will praise thee; in my heart, though not in heaven, I can raise thee.

Small it is, in this poor sort to enrol thee:

e'en eternity's too short to extol thee.
